

- String


If you have paint or markers at home, you can use them to decorate your creature, just don't buy anything new! Get creative by using what you have at home.

### Artist to Look At: Elisabeth Higgins O'Connor

Elisabeth Higgins O'Connor (b. 1963) is a Sacramentobased sculptor. She uses found domestic objects such as remnants of bedclothes, blankets, pillows, couch cushions, wood, quilting pins, Styrofoam, bedsheets, nails, and foam to create hulking sculptures inspired by mythology and natural history museum dioramas. Higgins O'Connor exhibited at Armory Center for the Arts as part of the 2009 Stitches exhibition.
